2006 POLK COUNTY MUSEUM NEWS LASH and Other Summer Programs

The **Land**, **Air**, **Soil & Water** educational program is a combined effort of the Polk County Historical Society, the D.D. Kennedy Environmental Area and the Polk County Land and Water Department. The LASH goal is to teach children the importance of learning about the past and saving the future. It provides a day of learning for area students consisting of a one-room school experience in the Lanesdale Schoolhouse, a tour of the Polk County Museum and an afternoon of environmental awareness at D.D. Kennedy Park.

April 19

A group of Osceola fourth grade students started their day at the Lanesdale School under the able tutelage of Leona Cummings, 2005 Polk County History Woman of the Year. They proceeded to the museum for guided tours led by Ralph LaDuke, Jim Gisch, Marge Hallquist, Marilyn Reiten, and Rosalie Kittleson.



At the Kennedy Park, Amy Kelsey, Polk County Land and Water Coordinator, divided the students into three groups, and then rotated the groups to see three presentations. Amy talked about water resources in Polk County, the Balsam Branch watershed, how we affect water quality and contribute pollution, and what we can do about it.

Jeremy Williamson, Water Quality Specialist with the Land and Water Resources Department, brought the students on a wetland walk and showed them some aquatic insects, aquatic plants, and described wetland soils.

Dave Peterson, Conservation Planner for the Land and Water Resources Department, described soil types in Polk County, how we can protect our soils in agricultural fields and during construction, and how soils reach and pollute our waters. He had a watershed model to illustrate his points.

April 20

The second group of Osceola students experienced our historical sites in Balsam Lake and proceeded to D.D. Kennedy Park where they participated in a walking tour of the park led by Rosalie Kittleson. Dale Cox and assistants from National Scenic Riverway conducted mucking—taking water samples and studying the water habitat.

May 16

The Luck Historical Society had an evening tour of the museum.

May 17

Valley Christian School students toured the museum.

May 18

Students of home schools joined Frederic and Clayton students for a day planned with the LASH program.

May 20

Seventeen ladies from the Amery Rambling Roses Red Hat Society toured the museum.



May 24 & 25

The Frederic School system sponsored Pioneer School Days at the Lanesdale School with Melinda Sorenson teaching.

May 25

St. Croix Falls fourth grade students enjoyed the LASH program.

June 3

The museum was part of Annalys Hanson's eighth birthday party. Annalys is a daughter of Nicole Hanson. Nicole has been PCHS secretary and served on the board before moving to New Prague, Minnesota.

June 12-30

Little Red Schoolhouse at the fairgrounds held its annual post-kindergarten one-room summer school classes with Vicki Engel. Vicki has taught these classes for over twenty years. Through the years she has collected nineteen century costumes that her students choose from to wear to school.

June 23

Laketown Homemakers toured the museum.

July 11-13

Sally Lowe used the Little Red Schoolhouse for a small group of home

school students.

July 13

Janet Dykema, Field Representative of the Northern Region Wisconsin Historical Society, visited the museum, answered questions and gave advice on caring for, storing and displaying artifacts.

Lanesdale Schoolhouse again opened the doors for children to experience school life 100 years ago. Thank you, Patricia Mac Donald, Luck, and assistant, Ashley Thompson, of Balsam Lake

The museum had a record attendance of 40 visitors.

Ruth Mugerauer and Marlene Gustafson's vision of teaching children in the one-room school atmosphere became a reality 17 years ago in the Amery summer school program and they have taught together since its conception. Through the years it has been a treat for Balsam Lake residents to see the prairie costumed children walking to the park carrying lunch pails.

Secretary's Report: Motion by Darrell Kittleson to approve, 2nd by Carl Johnson, passed.

Treasurer's Report: Given by Lois Hoff. Motion by Carl to approve, 2nd by Art, passed.

Director's Report: Read by Rosalie Kittleson. She asked the board's permission to seek grants to pay for the taping of Marge Hallquist and Dave Knutson discussing museum artifacts and displays. Motion by Ralph La Duke, 2nd by Diane Dueholm for Rosalie to go forward with grant requests, motion passed. She also suggested that we pay Todd Pfeifer \$100 for his work and use of his equipment in painting the building we used at the fairgrounds. Motion by Merle Bergren to make that payment, 2nd by Darrell Kittleson, passed.

- 2. Rosalie applied for a \$3000 grant from the Deaver Foundation for Pioneering Schooling. It will pay for supplies and transportation cost reimbursement to the public schools.

New Business:


- 1. Steve from St. Croix Restoration will work on the drainage issue at the Lanesdale School. The basement needs to be painted with a water sealer and some of the peg boards need to be replaced because of past water problems. Rosalie has added this to the budget request.
- 2. The upstairs displays need to be completely cleaned in September and October.
- 3. The museum will close after Labor Day. Rosalie will continue to go to the museum two days a week.
- 4 Tickets are available for the Red Hat Tea to be held on September 21st at Paradise Landing. The fashion show will be of military uniforms and the dresses for the same time periods.
- 5. Our annual election is in October. A letter of resignation has been received from Jim Gisch. He and Merle Bergren are ending their first term. Merle is eligible for reelection. Rey Lark has indicated that he's interested in serving again. We also need someone to fill the remaining two years of Nicole Hanson's first term. President Muriel appointed Merle and Ralph to be the nominating committee.
- 6. There was a discussion regarding e-mail newsletters. Most felt that we should go back to mailing all of them. Darrell Kittleson made a motion that we drop e-mail, 2nd by Ralph LaDuke, passed. There was a discussion about keeping the Polk County Libraries on our mailing list, it was decided that we should.
- 7. Rosalie passed out copies of the budget request that she will present to the county board on Monday, August 28th. It is close to meeting their request of a 10% cut.

- 8. There is money in our budget to promote special events in 2007. Darrell made a proposal that in 2007 we consider reducing the number of days the museum is open to four days per week. Tuesday and Thursday are the slowest days. Most board members said they would not like to see it closed; some related how disappointing it had been to them, to arrive at a museum and find it not open that day. No decision made at this time.
- 9. The 2007 bus tour will go to Burnett County June 8th. Stops will include Forts Folle Avoine in Webster, Alpha Cheese Plant, Alpha Covenant Church and Old Settler's Cemetery.
- 10. The September meeting will be the 26th; lunch will be served by Carl Johnson and Ralph LaDuke.
- 11. A check for \$100 was received from Bradley Johnson in honor of his father, Lloyd's, birthday. We are to use it as we choose; all were in agreement that it should go into the elevator fund.
