

PCHS votes YES for Elevator Addition

The first order of business at the April 24 PCHS general meeting was the proposed elevator addition for the museum. President Muriel Pfeifer asked for and received a motion and second to go forward with the project. The voice vote passed with no discussion.

Most of the Jensens in Polk County have a trail back to one of three areas—Luck, Bone Lake, or Eureka!

Erling Jensen, the host for Polk County Historical Society's May outing, is third generation Jensen from the Eureka area.

Grandfather Christ H. Jensen immigrated here in 1880 at age 18. In 1883 he was baptized and joined the Eureka Baptist Church. By 1888 he had purchased 40 acres of land in Section 17, Eureka Township and later added an 80-acre piece adjacent to the north where he built himself a home. Christ married recent immigrant, Inez Christina Jensen in 1898. Christ and Christina were both naturalized that year although Christ was the only English speaker at the time the 1900 census was taken. Christina was baptized and joined the church in 1901 about the same time as son Stanley J. was born. Following Stanley, in three-year intervals, came Stella B., Bernice A, Raymond, and Kenneth.

Stanley stayed on at the home place where he farmed with his wife Hazel Phelps This is where Erling and brothers Gerald and Eldon and one sister Louise started their lives. Before Erling started school, the family moved to the northwest corner of Long Lake in Balsam Lake Township. The Jensen children attended school at Centuria, a two-mile walk. Erling was in high school when the family moved to the present location where Erling and Betty raised their four children.

Pamela Kay, the Jensen's only daughter, teaches near Green Bay, where her husband Tom Hughes is superintendent of the same high school that sons, Kyle and Jonathon attend.

Sons Kerry and Rodney make their homes here in Polk County. Kerry and Ginger (Mauer) and daughters Alexis and Madeline and son Jacob live south of Dresser. Rodney and Adela and daughter Tia live on Balsam Lake. Marc lives on the home place.

All three sons work at Andersen Windows in Bayport, where their father worked for 35 years before retiring in 1996. Erling and Betty now spend their winter in Florida.

"Born the fifth of eight children to Betel and Marie (Mortensen) Petersen, Opal came after Pearl before Ruby. . . I'm sure Bertel and Marie look down with satisfaction."

It is the end of Opal's 1989 handwritten account, both sides of four pages, to her sisters and brothers and families on the occasion of the family party on Lake Hubert. Opal's life ended here on earth this last fall, but she left a legacy of notes, articles, and pictures of the Polk County area.

The Polk County genealogical and historical societies received many boxes of her collections. As I went through her boxes, the one that touched me the most emotionally was her collection of recipes. Recipes reach not only the body—they reach the core of womanhood—nourishing the family, body, and soul.



That year the Soo Line Railroad extended tracks through Amery and the next half dozen years brought many settlers and a building boom to Amery. We are still awaiting the annual reports from the Luck and SELS Historical Societies – Patty will send a reminder letter.

Other activities that are coming up are the Auction on June 30 (contact David Knutson if you have donations) and the Veterans Dinner Dance on August 19 at The TAC Entertainment Center.

Old Business – Christmas in July has been moved to October and we will have our meeting and an open house at the museum. New Business - The newsletter was discussed and the type-size will remain the same, and we will continue to mail it. Pioneer School will be the week of July 30th at the Lanesdale School. There will be a charge of \$50.00. The "Little Red Schoolhouse" at the fairgrounds will be shared by the Luck and SELS Historical Societies with the help from the other societies during the fair. The meeting ended with Dave Knutson reporting on the workshop he attended in Eau Claire on "Managing Historical Records."

Director's Comments

The museum is looking very nice with new displays. The displays were completed with the help of Marilyn Reiten, Martha Filip, Dave Knutson, and me in preparation of the 2007 school tours and visitors. The Unity High School students again helped with spring clean up with yard work and many different chores throughout the museum. I will be working with a 4-H group and St.Croix Falls school students for additional help at the Lanesdale School.

Thanks to the Marion Park Deaver Foundation, Amery Community Foundation, and the Amery Farmers Co-op, we now have an Educational Center at the Kennedy Park to accommodate the school tours for conservation and history studies.

The coal room roof was repaired and new ventilation is improving the movement of air in the basement. This is helpful in keeping the basement dryer for the preservation of artifacts. The elevator addition is now in the hands of the county to put out for bids; we are waiting to see the notice in the Inter-County Leader. We hope to start ground breaking this year. Jon Cermin has volunteered to help with the lighting at the museum; many of our lamps need to be replaced. We will be looking at some new lighting that has been recently introduced to the public. Can you believe May 29 will be our third program? We have had very interesting speakers, and it is always fun to see everyone enjoying the luncheons and conversation after the meetings.
